CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2026

Dear Resident,

I am delighted to provide you with this year's Swanton Morley Parish Council annual report. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of the work the Parish Council has carried out on your behalf and our plans for the year ahead.

YOUR PARISH COUNCIL TEAM

Our Clerk, Kelly Pickard works in our Parish office based at the village hall. The public opening hours are Monday - Thursday 9am-12pm. Information about the work of the council can be found on our website, village noticeboards, the Mardler newsletter and the Link-Up magazine. Kelly and I also communicate regularly with residents using social media. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Kelly and all of our councillors for their hard work and who have each taken on responsibility for specific aspects of our work and have carried out practical work, as well as providing regular reports for the Parish Council meetings. The proactive attitude of our Council team ensures that this is a vibrant and effective Parish Council.

YOUR COUNCIL TAX BILL

Our precept requirement has increased from £97,905.00 in 2025-26 to £113,012.00 in 2026-27. This is necessary to cover increases in our costs and also to pay for specific projects which I will set out in this report. Unfortunately, after three years of increases in our tax base (number of households paying council tax) this year there has been a decrease from 851 to 810. This is out of our control and the figure is determined by Breckland Council.

The result of this is that for the first time since 2023-24 we have had to increase the Parish Council element of your Council Tax bill from £115 in 2025-26 to £139 in 2026-27 for a Band D property. 80% of households in Swanton Morley are in bands A – C so pay a lower figure than this. We always endeavour to try and obtain grant funding and match funding where possible to assist with expenditure and we have been successful in this for items such as play equipment, the neighbourhood plan, and small highway improvements. In addition, we also seek to receive commuted sums of money from qualifying housing developments to pay for the ongoing maintenance of new assets such as open space areas and these funds are kept in an interest bearing account. Swanton Morley has a significant amount of assets and facilities compared to most other villages, all of which require ongoing maintenance and improvement. Our budget provides the means to do this so that residents can continue to take pride in our village.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

The Parish Council has in the last twelve months formed a new Neighbourhood Watch scheme and we are grateful to Norfolk Police for their assistance in this endeavour, and the four volunteers who are helping to run the scheme. Sadly, over a prolonged period of time residents in various parts of the village have been subjected to antisocial behaviour with adults being mainly responsible for this. Having consulted with Breckland Council, the Parish Council has decided to secure the services of their Safer Street Wardens service. They will be in the village once a fortnight, but we will be in regular contact with them at other times. They will be able to liaise with Norfolk Police and other third parties such as businesses and housing associations, as well as the Parish Council. They will patrol the village from the beginning of May. They will engage with residents to provide reassurance and a point of contact if there are any issues we are currently unaware of. The Clerk and I have met with them, and they are already aware of areas of concern in the village. They are able to issue certain fixed penalty notices, community protection notices, abandoned vehicles notices and enter on to land or premises. This service is designed to complement the Police service. This will be a twelve month trial at a cost of £3,588.00.

STREET LIGHTING

The Parish Council currently has one hundred and twelve streetlights in the village.

In the last year we have had the six yearly electrical inspection & testing carried out on all of these by our contractor. General repairs are carried out as and when required.

Having been approached by a concerned resident it has come to our attention that there is a highway safety concern on Greengate near the junction with Bennett Road. There have been a number of minor accidents involving parked cars in this location. This area is very poorly lit and residents in this location have no access to off road parking. The Parish Council has therefore decided to fund the installation of an additional streetlight in this location at a cost of £2,850.00

BUS SHELTER

Thanks to improved government funding for public transport, the Parish Council was approached by Norfolk County Council to see if we would like to apply for grant funding towards a bus shelter. The village currently does not have any shelters. Some bus stops in the village are well used and we therefore decided to apply for funding for one shelter at a cost of £5,179.00. Our application was successful and we obtained 80% of the funding for this so the cost to the Parish Council was £1,036.00. This will be installed at the Primrose Square bus stop in May. The Parish Council will keep this under review and consider further investment in the future for other bus stops in the village.

CHURCHYARD & BURIAL GROUND

The Parish Council has responsibility for maintaining the churchyard and in the months ahead we will be arranging to have various fencing repairs carried out to replace some rotten posts and refix some areas of rabbit fencing. The war memorial will be cleaned in time for Remembrance in November. We would also like to place on record our thanks to Chris Beale for the volunteer work he does to keep the churchyard maintained. We also pay for the annual maintenance charge to have the church clock maintained. The Burial Ground in Hoe Road East continues to be maintained to a high standard. Now that the water supply is connected, we will be reviewing the condition of the rose memorial garden and work out a plan to improve this area. The Parish Council is very grateful to the Swanton Morley Men's Shed for the work they have undertaken to refurbish the noticeboard. The Clerk and I recently undertook training for burial ground regulations and we will undertake further such training later this year. This, along with the purchase of specific management software will help us to modernise and improve all of our record keeping and maintenance requirements in this area of the council's work.

ALLOTMENTS

The Parish Council currently has twenty nine allotment plots. We currently have one half plot available, so if you are interested in taking this on, please do contact our Clerk, Kelly. It is always very pleasing to see the wide variety of produce which is grown on the site, which is a testament to the hard work put in by our tenants who all pay an annual charge for their respective plots. The Parish Council leases this site from a local landowner and pays them an annual rent.

ENVIRONMENT

The Parish Council are responsible for maintaining Burgh Common, located on the bank of the River Wensum. We employ a specialist contractor to cut the weeds in the river and tidy up the riverbank, making it easier for anglers to use the site for fishing. The Parish Council also maintains Mill Common. This is a site of special scientific interest and is subject to a Countryside Stewardship scheme for which the Parish Council receives an annual income from the government. In the summer months, as part of this agreement we allow a local farmer to graze their cattle on there. The use of cattle is important to promote healthy growth of the scientifically important flora & fauna which grows on the common. We are very grateful to the Harris family for their help with this. This year we will also be carrying out some tree work at Little Common which the Parish Council is also responsible for maintaining. We have been informed that the Environment Agency is embarking on a programme of inspection and cutting back overgrown/fallen vegetation along the River Wensum and we look forward to seeing some improvement when this work is carried out. We have an ongoing agreement with Swanton Morley Farms to keep open several footpaths in the village. These are all detailed on our website including location maps. We know that it is important to residents that these footpaths

remain open for them to enjoy, but the Parish Council does pay an annual fee for this access and this forms part of our precept. I would ask that you treat the countryside with respect and pick up your litter and your dog's mess and place it in the bins provided by the Parish Council or alternatively take your rubbish home and place it in your wheelie bin.

HIGHWAYS

It is fair to say that the most frequent complaints we receive are about speeding traffic and the poor state of the roads and footpaths in the village. Norfolk County Council (NCC) is responsible for highway maintenance. When defects are reported to the Parish Council our Clerk logs these on the NCC website. At that point we are completely in the hands of the NCC Highways Department as to if/when a defect is repaired. To help the Parish Council I would encourage residents to also log defects on the NCC website. This can be done anonymously if preferred and the weblink is:

I would also encourage you to contact our county councillor with your concerns. At this time we do not know who will be our county councillor after the elections being held on 7th May. Due to a boundary change, Swanton Morley no longer forms part of the Elmham & Mattishall ward but now forms part of the Launditch ward and as such we will have a new councillor.

After the winter period ended, Kelly and I inspected all of the roads and footpaths within our parish boundary and reported over a hundred defects to NCC. Some of these have now been repaired, others are still awaiting repair and others NCC have deemed not serious enough to warrant repair at this time. We have also requested that Breckland Council sweep some sections of footpaths and roads to remove debris. We are pleased that NCC have carried out the resurfacing of the waterfall bridges to a high standard. We have also asked them to repaint the road markings outside the shops and this work is scheduled to be done. The last remaining section of substandard concrete footpath on part of Hannah Road also needs replacing and we have asked NCC to inspect this, hopefully with a view to replacing it with new.

Responding to residents concerns about speeding traffic, three years ago the Parish Council set up a community speed watch scheme in conjunction with Norfolk Constabulary. We currently have seven volunteers for this. Sessions are run successfully with Norfolk Constabulary, sending letters to motorists found to be exceeding the 30mph village speed limit. We are required to have three trained volunteers present at each session. The training takes a short amount of time and speed watch sessions are one hour duration. If you think you could help us with this, we would love to hear from you so that we can run more sessions. The statistics provided from this scheme, combined with the data provided from our SAM speed signs, provide valuable data for Norfolk Constabulary. On the back of this they have also conducted some mobile speed enforcement camera sessions in the village.

Having been approached by the school and some parents with their concerns about road safety along Manns Lane, we asked NCC if we could have a 20mph limit along a section of the road and improved line marking. I am pleased to say that they have approved a scheme and provided 50% match funding of £5,794.00 with the Parish Council funding the remaining 50%. Work has already begun on this project.

GROUNDS MAINTENANCE

A few years ago I reported to you about the changes to the Norfolk County Council grass cutting contract affecting many of our estate roads. These areas were previously cut under contract by Breckland Council using their contractor, Serco. Norfolk County Council decided to end this contract and we were faced with them only cutting these areas twice a year. In 2022 we entered into an agreement with Norfolk County Council whereby they provide us with a sum

of money and we cut these areas instead. The Parish Council now have these areas cut by Breckland Council at the same time as they cut other pieces of land which they own in the village. Breckland Council also cut the hedges for us once a year along the frontage of Thompson Close and Hannah Road. We have had to allow additional money in our precept to cover the cost of sufficient grass cuts, and the hedge cutting needed, to keep these areas tidy as the money provided by Norfolk County Council does not cover the whole cost. We have also included money in our precept for a separate qualified contractor to carry out some verge cutting, which in our view Norfolk County Council does not do often enough along Rectory Road, Manns Lane, Gooseberry Hill and the Dereham Road bends. We recently undertook a formal tender process for our grass cutting contracts. Our current dedicated contractor who cuts the grass in the churchyard and Hoe Road East burial ground was reappointed and a new contractor was appointed to carry out the cutting in all other areas such as the village green, village hall, Davidson Park and playing fields. We currently employ the services of four separate grass cutting contractors in order to keep the village tidy.

Our solicitors are currently finalising the legal paperwork for the ownership of open spaces and the children's play area on the new Swanton Vale development to be transferred to the Parish Council. When this happens, we will seek to add this work to the schedule of one of our contractors. When the legal title of these areas passes to the Parish Council a financial contribution of approximately £56,000 will be provided by Hopkins Homes for the future maintenance of these areas.

OPEN SPACES

Having successfully obtained grant funding of £20,000, new swings and safety surfacing was installed in the Gooseberry Hill Playing Field. Over the past year there have been ongoing inspections carried out on the open spaces and any repair work deemed necessary has been carried out. It is now 18 years since the much loved timber framed equipment was installed and thanks to our ongoing inspections and repairs of this it should still last for several years to come. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Councillor Jim Venworth for his tireless work in maintaining our play areas and the work he does with Kelly to raise grant funding for new equipment wherever we can.

PLANNING

Following the publication of the National Planning Policy Framework in December 2024. Breckland Council is now required to build significantly more homes per year across the district. Work on their Local Development Plan review is at an advanced stage and the Parish Council continues to engage in this process. There will be one more round of public consultation this summer before the draft plan is examined in public by HM Planning Inspectorate. In the last round of consultation, Swanton Morley was not earmarked for further development in the village, mainly due to the fact that our Neighbourhood Plan adopted, in 2019, already earmarks the fields opposite the school along Hoe Road East for up to 120 new homes. Other sites already having planning permission and/or completed were also taken into consideration. The Parish Council, with the help of a dedicated group of volunteers and a planning consultant have been carrying out a five yearly review of the Swanton Morley Neighbourhood Plan. We would like to thank everyone who attended our open public event last April and responded to the public consultation. The information gathered was very useful in helping us finalise the draft plan. We are now waiting for an independent examiner to be appointed who will review and comment on the plan. We will of course keep you updated on our progress.

THE FUTURE OF ROBERTSON BARRACKS

In the last year we have had two meetings with Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) and their project team as well as representatives from Hoe and Worthing Parish Meeting and Breckland Council. DIO provided a quite basic outline of their plans for the site and asked us for our views. They advised that they were going away to carry out more in depth work such as traffic surveys. In recent months we have had no contact from DIO and we have received no further information. We will of course keep residents informed once we receive further news and information.

THE ANGEL PUBLIC HOUSE

Earlier this year the Parish Council registered the pub with Breckland Council as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) and this application was initially approved. This would have meant that if the freehold owners wished to sell it, the community would have had the opportunity to first express an interest in buying it. Unfortunately, we have now been advised by Breckland Council that the owners have appealed this decision and that this appeal has been upheld. We have been advised that there are two key tests for a successful ACV application and that we met the first test which was to demonstrate that the pub had been a focal point for social gathering in our village only quite recently. It was also noted that the pub has historic significance having been the home of Abraham Lincoln's ancestor. The second test required more evidence that there is community interest in retaining this perhaps as a community pub. To do this a volunteer community group would need to be formed to draw up a potential business plan to purchase, refurbish and run it as a new venture, like that which has been achieved with the White Swan in Gressenhall. At the present time we are not aware that such a group of committed individuals has come forward to do this. If such a group was formed the Parish Council would be willing to work with them. We have asked Breckland Council's historic buildings officer to contact the owners and ensure the grade II listed building is watertight and not left to deteriorate.

TRANSFER OF LAND OWNERSHIP

Last year Breckland Council offered to sell to the Parish Council areas of green open space they currently own in the village for a sum in excess of £50,000. We rejected this proposal having already had an independent valuation carried out for a lower amount. Now, thanks in part to the forthcoming local government reorganisation, Breckland Council have offered to transfer this land to us at nil cost. Whilst choosing not to take ownership of some small parcels which could present future legal and maintenance problems, the Parish Council has agreed to take on the ownership of the majority of green open space in Thompson Close and Middleton Avenue. This presents us with an opportunity to work with residents in that area to improve these spaces and it also provides a future Parish Council with an option to extend the burial ground if it wishes. The Parish Council has to fund its own legal fees for this, and our solicitors are now working on the transfer documents with Breckland Council. They have also agreed to fund the cost of grass cutting in these areas for the remainder of this financial year.

OTHER NEWS

Last Christmas, regrettably, we were only able to install one Christmas Tree. My son, Sean usually helps me install the lights around the village but on this occasion, we had a close family bereavement, and we had more pressing family matters to attend to. I would like to thank Bernie Marsham for his kind donation of the tree. I am sorry if this disappointed some people, but I do hope you will be understanding of why the display was greatly reduced. We have yet to plan what we will do this year in terms of the Christmas lights but it is my intention to definitely improve on last year.

I would like to thank everyone who came to our annual Carol concert in the church. This was once again a great success, and I would like to thank Dereham Band, Swanton Morley Butchers, Swanton Morley Stores and Father Christmas for their ongoing support. This year's concert will take place on Saturday 5th December.

AND FINALLY...

The Annual Parish Meeting will this year be held on Monday 18th May commencing at 7.00pm. For those residents who are unable to attend this meeting but would like to ask a question or raise a concern, I am happy for you to contact myself or our Clerk directly and we will do our best to help you.

All that remains for me to say is a big thank you to everyone who has contributed in some way to our village way of life throughout the year. It is very much appreciated.

Swanton Morley Village Hall Report 2026

Swanton Morley Village Hall has had a good year during 2025/2026.

Over the last twelve months the Village provided a venue for 2 weddings, 32 private parties, the 2025 Strong Man competition, Wellbeing fayres, Gardening club, Poultry Show, the Dog Agility weekend to name a few.

In August the Village Hall also celebrated its 30th birthday with a families day and karaoke in the evening.

Following the successful application to RWE we were able to have 35 solar panels installed onto the village hall roof. This, along with the previously installed LED lighting has made a considerable difference to the hall's running costs.

In April this year across 62 hours, 10 volunteers gave their time to carry out remedial work in the main hall including repainting. With thanks to all of the volunteers who helped with this project and to the Brewers Foundation for the funding for the materials.

The Community café continues to run every Tuesday morning and provides coffee/tea and cake and fruit bowls. Our lovely volunteer Sharon is a wonderful asset to the team who gives her time to serve all members of the community.

The pop up pantry continues to provide cost effective food and home consumables as well as any advice required. There are sometimes additional services available to assist with energy saving and other important advice.

The Village hall have been a lucky recipient of £1,000 grant funding to provide a wildlife area on the grounds, this work is still being undertaken but this area will also provide a wonderful back drop for weddings held at the venue.

Looking to 2026/27 this year is already booked up with 11 weddings and 48 private functions, we also see the return of the wonderful wellbeing fayre, charity cycling event and Norfolk Poultry show.

In addition to this we have a charity quiz night in May raising funds for EACH and the staff at the Village hall are looking to host an 'open mic, battle of the bands' evening in summer.
