Plenty of information is available in the building on the noticeboards but if you have any queries please do not hesitate to ask.

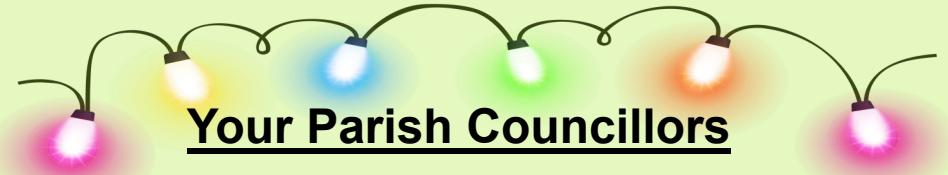
There are still many regular hire groups that continue to use and enjoy the facilities so we would like to thank every one for supporting the amazing facility.

Christmas Crinkle Cookies

- 60g cocoa powder, sieved
- 200g caster sugar
- 60ml vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs
- 180g plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 oranges, zested
- 2 tsp mixed spice
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 50g icing sugar



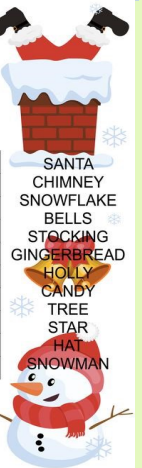
Method

1. Mix the cocoa, caster sugar and oil together. Add the eggs one at a time, whisking until fully combined.
2. Combine the flour, baking powder, orange zest, mixed spice, cinnamon and a pinch of salt in a separate bowl, then add to the cocoa mixture and mix until a soft dough forms. If it feels too soft, put in the fridge to chill for 1 hr.
3. Heat the oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5 and tip the icing sugar into a shallow dish. Roll heaped teaspoons of the dough into balls (about 20g each), then roll in the icing sugar to coat. Put the balls on one large or two medium baking trays lined with baking parchment, ensuring they're evenly spaced apart.
4. Bake on the middle rack of the oven for 10 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool – they will firm up as they cool, but still be fudgy in the centre. Will keep for up to four days in an airtight container

Winter Support

As the weather grows colder and the evenings grow darker, help is still available if it is needed.

Household support fund—Residents in financial hardship can self-refer to the Household Support Fund for support with food and energy vouchers, or alternative financial support. Applications can be made to the Norfolk Assistance Scheme or through your Breckland Councillor Roger Atterwill on 07841 488860.

Breckland Food bus—access affordable, nutritious food and household essentials, plus an information, advice and guidance service to support with the issues you are experiencing.

Food banks in Breckland welcome and support everyone who is referred to them, always acting with respect and without judgment. Volunteers will give a minimum of three days' emergency food and offer support to resolve some of the difficulties you might be facing.

In order to get help from a food bank you will need to be referred with a voucher, which can be obtained from Breckland Council. Call 01362 656870 or e-mail communitysupport@breckland.gov.uk

Universal credit—If your circumstances have changed due to job loss or reduced hours, you may be eligible to apply for Universal Credit, find out how to claim by calling the Universal Credit helpline: 0800 3285644

Pension Credit is available to residents of State Pension age and on a low income, to help with living costs. Pension credit is a 'passport' benefit which allows access to other support such as Warm Homes Discount and NHS dental treatment

The Vulnerability Registration Service [VRS] gives vulnerable people a single place to register their status, helping them avoid repeating the same difficult conversations each time they engage with organisations such as lenders and creditors. The service aims to help vulnerable consumers protect themselves against the financial, social and personal hardship suffered as a result of debt and financial problems

Planning News

At the behest of the Government, Breckland Council has embarked on a review of its Local Development Plan. When completed this will shape development planning and growth in the district until 2046.

In Spring of this year Breckland Council issued a call for possible development sites across the district. Swanton Morley is not immune from this process. The call for sites was extended to 1st December but below is a weblink to where you can find the information relating to sites put forward as at September. As you will see there are 15 sites which have been put forward so far. We will be informed early in 2023 if any more sites have come forward as a result of extending the deadline.

It must be stressed that just because a site has been put forward by a landowner does not mean that the site will be considered acceptable by Breckland Council in terms of potential development. Upon reviewing the sites put forward so far, some have previously been submitted and rejected and some have extremely poor road and footpath connectivity meaning that they are likely to be deemed as unsustainable locations. Our Swanton Morley Neighbourhood Plan is something the planning officers will also have to take great care to consider as part of their conclusions as far as Swanton Morley is concerned. I have emphasised this fact to the Director of Planning.

One brownfield site looms larger than all others and this is Robertson Barracks which is scheduled to close in in a few years time. The Defence Infrastructure Organisation has put forward the site for mixed employment and housing use with up to 2000 homes. The largest part of the site which is the airfield is in the neighbouring parish of Hoe & Worthing. The existing homes on the site are already earmarked to be sold off. Given the possibilities to generate employment on the site making use of the many existing technical buildings and the available brownfield land on which to build new homes, it is highly likely that this site will be developed especially as it will no doubt be driven very hard by Whitehall.

In 2023 the Parish Council will be actively engaging with Breckland Council to help shape the Local Development Plan review. We will submit our formal comments on each site once Breckland officers have carried out their analysis. I have also spoken to George Freeman MP specifically concerning the Robertson Barracks site and the need for Breckland Council and MOD to engage with the local community at the earliest opportunity. The Parish Council will provide updated information to residents as it becomes available.

This process will run until 2026/27 and will be a marathon and not a sprint. It will require patience and attention to a great deal of detail. I am confident that the Parish Council and if required its planning advisors including legal advice, can meet this challenge.

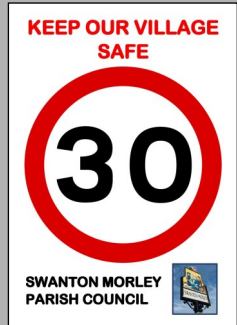

Making Swanton Morley Sustainable



CASM (Climate Action for Swanton Morley) is a group of Councillors and parishioners, who meet to consider what small steps we can take as a village to combat climate change and improve our environment to benefit both people and wildlife.

Following a prolonged interlude, due to Covid, the Climate Action Swanton Morley group was relaunched at an event held in the Village Hall on St George's Day. Konnect Buses and pupils from Northgate School gave presentations and villagers had an opportunity to state their concerns relating to climate change.

We have been successful in receiving a grant from Norfolk County Council to establish a tree nursery. This will enable us to grow on trees for planting out giving them a better chance of survival. In keeping with the ethos of recycling, an old village notice board has been reused for the tree nursery. Many thanks to Alasdair Monteith and Jim Venworth for the work they have put in in setting up the nursery.

We had a visit to the Norse Environmental Waste Services centre at Costessey. All the household recyclable waste in Norfolk is sorted at this centre for onward processing. Please remember to recycle as much as you can; bring your glass to the Village Hall bottle bank as this is a more effective way to recycle glass as it does not need to be sorted.

For Big Green Week at the end of September a litter pick was organized and 9 bags of litter were collected from roads in the Village. Please be conscious of our local countryside and do not throw litter from your car window or drop it whilst out and about.

Climate Action Swanton Morley has demonstrated its medial presence through two interviews held with BBC Norfolk and also on our revamped Facebook that we hope will point to useful links locally and globally.

The Climate Action Group meets once a month, check the Facebook page for dates for 2023.

Public Footpaths, Byways and Permissive Footpaths

This year the landowner and I erected new posts and signage for all but one of the Permissive Footpaths in the parish. This remaining path is quite uneven underfoot with exposed tree roots.

It is unlikely that this Permissive Way will remain in use, as access to Harkers Lane from Hoe Road East can be made via the Swanton Vale development when completed. To replace this the landowner has agreed to create a new Permissive Way linking Greens Lane to Hoe Road North. New posts and signage will be installed there shortly.

There is one final note and that is on the subject of dog poo. It applies to all the Footpaths and Permissive Ways around the village and is a huge problem, particularly for those who live nearby. If your dog goes to the toilet on a walk, bag it up and put it in one of the numerous Poo Bins around the village, or take it home, rather than selfishly leave it on the ground.

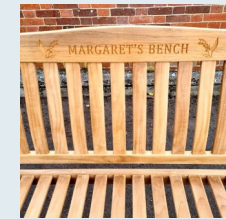
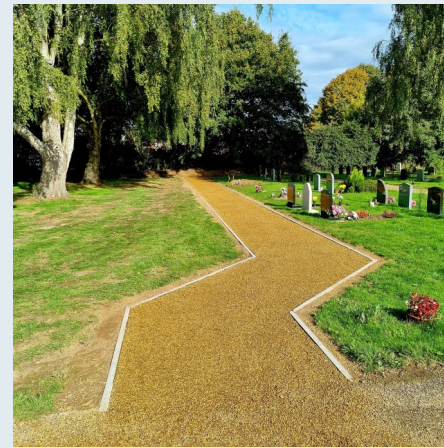
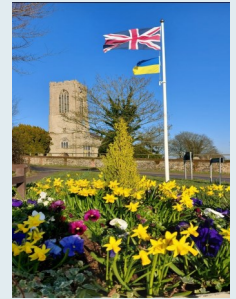
Village Information Map

Burial Ground and Churchyard

The main change in the past year is the improvement to the burial ground achieved through funding from Breckland Council, this has enabled two additional pathways to be laid which paves the way for further expansion of burial ground. To improve the growth of roses in the memorial garden, following the thinning of some trees a water supply is to be installed that will allow relatives to care better for the roses planted in memory of loved ones.

In the Churchyard the main issue has been controlling moles that were very active last winter and spring.

In both the Churchyard and Burial ground a major issue has been the quality of the grass cutting by our contractors; a new contract and service level agreement is being prepared for 2023 that sets out the standards with which your Parish Council expects in these sensitive areas. This year the grass suffered from the dry summer, but following the autumn rains is now growing vigorously along with some weeds. There are times when we have to make a decision on whether we prefer a manicured "bowling green" look or a more environmentally diverse naturalist appearance to the grassed areas of these locations.

In August a detailed inspection was made of both areas and there are plans to budget for repairs and improvements when the 2023/24 budget is set early next year.



Swanton Morley Allotments

There is something very satisfying in being able to grow your own fruit and vegetables.

Swanton Morley Allotments have certainly proved popular against this year. There have been new tenants taking on a plot and the site has become a vibrant area together with a new tree nursery.

Currently there is a waiting list for any available plots, if you would like to be added to this please contact the Clerk.

Open spaces

The Parish Council are responsible for a number of open spaces in the Village including the Village Green which is once again alive with colour for the Christmas display.

We maintain Gooseberry Hill play area and have been carrying out maintenance and repair work through the year while we work on a project for this area behind the scenes. We hope to have more information soon on a possible new piece of equipment.

Davidson Park will soon see some new trees being planted and new posts being installed towards the upkeep of the area.



Thanks to generous funding by The National Lottery Community Fund, Swanton Morley Parish Council and Wensum Valley Electrical, The Swanton Morley Platinum Jubilee Festival began on Thursday 2nd June with a 'Family Fun Sports Day' at Swanton Morley Village Hall. Four days of celebration and competitions concluded with Dereham Band's 'Brass on the Grass' in the village hall on Sunday 5th June.

We had 16 wonderful entries to the Best Wreath Competition and 10 magnificent and inventive entries for the Royal Themed "Build a Scarecrow" competition

All events over the Jubilee weekend were family-friendly and FREE to attend for all parishioners. On Thursday 2nd June, the Family fun sports afternoon was well attended with rounders, sack race, tug of war and an egg and spoon race held at Swanton Morley Village Hall from 12 noon. Who knew that both adults and children could be so competitive!

The evening continued with Lighting the Beacon at Swanton Morley Village Hall. The children's lantern parade was stunning as dusk fell. We paused to listen to the amazing peals from Swanton Morley Bell Ringers ringing the special Jubilee celebration changes. At precisely 21:35, in common with hundreds (thousands?) of other communities across Great Britain and the Commonwealth, Pipe Major John Welton played one of many special Jubilee compositions, "Diu Regnare". This was followed at 21:40 by Brenda O'Dowd playing the bugle call, "Majesty". Our Parish Chair, Roger Atterwill lit the Jubilee Beacon at 21:45 as we listened to the Commonwealth Song.

On Friday 3rd June, All Saints Church held an open day for quiet prayer and an opportunity for parishioners to sign the Jubilee memorial book



On Saturday 4th June, Judging took place of the scarecrow and wreath making competitions. Thank you to Andrea Elsdon for her time and independent judgement of the incredibly high standard of entries. In the evening, Darbys Freehouse held a music evening.

On Sunday 5th June The Jubilee Service at All Saints Church was the perfect and most appropriate way to begin this day of greatest celebration. As the afternoon began, so did the rain and we moved indoors where Swanton Morley Village Hall hosted the Big Jubilee Picnic with indoor garden games, face painting, crafts and music. We were treated to a performance from the RockaVox Choir to open the picnic. Then the Galaxy Twirlers gave a spectacular demonstration of their artistry. This was followed by Alistair Monteith and his Kung Fu Company with their thrilling and breath-taking display of Chinese Martial Arts.

The City of Norwich Pipe Band made a dramatic entrance to give us the stirring sound of the wonderful virtuoso piping. We were very lucky to be able to book the band as they are always in demand.

Dereham Band's Brass on the Grass closed the Festival with their concert of traditional and modern patriotic music. The band were privileged to be able to accompany 4 pipers playing Highland Cathedral, which many members of audience agreed made the hairs on the back of the neck stand on end.
